

Buddhism Centre Trip

During our enrichment week, Year 9 had the fantastic opportunity of visiting Buddha Land – a Buddhist Centre in Keighley and meeting a Buddhist nun called Dra-ma. It was a lot of fun and a very interesting experience for all involved, it allowed us to learn a lot more about Buddhism from someone who has first hand experience.

We left school and walked down to Skipton train station through Aireville park and then we hopped on the train to Keighley. We walked through Keighley for a little while before we reached the Buddhist centre.

We were kindly welcomed by Dra-ma, who asked us to remove our shoes as a sign of respect and then led us to the meditation room where we had a look around the beautiful shrines and interesting offerings. Each shrine has an image of a different Buddha or teacher with offerings in front of them. Buddhists do not use these shrines to pray to, but to focus their attention on whilst meditating and to pay respect and gratitude to the Buddha and his teachings.

Dra-ma then sat us down and talked to us about Buddhism, she shared her personal experiences and some stories about the Buddha. We were then lead through a guided meditation that focused on our breathing and just being in the moment. Dra-ma sat in front of us and explained how to sit and how to focus. Firstly, we were to try and clear our minds by focusing on one thing, this is an attempt to keep your mind at peace. Buddhists try to do this so they can become closer to

achieving enlightenment – the gaining of true knowledge about the self or the nature of reality and gaining freedom from the cycle of re-birth. Dra-ma asked us to focus on our breathing, to count to six breaths and then start again (and if we got distracted then just start again from one), telling us to focus on the sensation of breathing in and out at the bottom of our nose. Buddhists usually focus on something like breathing while meditating because it is something we all do naturally, and it is easy to focus on.

After the meditation we had the opportunity to ask Dra-ma questions about her own experience as a Buddhist and she helped us to understand some of the key concepts of Buddhism.

Overall, the trip was a great experience and we all enjoyed ourselves. It gave us an opportunity to go somewhere we had never been before and truly understand Buddhism.

Charvisri Ataka (Costume, Year 7):


I learnt how to collaborate with others, be flexible and meet new people.



Careers in Film and TV Production







Our National Theatre Journey

The National Theatre Connections Project (NTCP) is a festival run by the National Theatre, where 10 playwrights are commissioned to write new plays for young people, and then schools and companies all around the UK produce and perform them. It is an annual festival with around 300 companies taking part.

In November 2021, there was an advertisement in our school daily bulletin saying Ilkley Playhouse were auditioning for a play called Circle Dreams, as part of the National Theatre Connections Project (NTCP). It was a small, local play and a good opportunity to learn the ropes of auditioning, and if we got parts, the process of acting professionally. Grace and I didn't know each other at all before the audition, but we both found out we got parts the day after auditioning!

We started the process in January 2023, and it was full on. We rehearsed for 2 hours, 3 times every week. Even though it took a lot of work and dedication, it was an amazing experience. We performed in Ilkley on the 2nd, 3rd and 4th of March 2023, in front of friends, family and Jack Bradfield, a NTCP judge. We spoke to him afterwards and he thoroughly enjoyed the experience, and couldn't wait to see us in York, for the official competition. We had a few rehearsals after that, then travelled to York on April 30th 2023. We had a full day of workshops, tech rehearsals, watching other performances, and finally performing. It was really exciting and was our first time performing on a professional stage.

In May 2023, we got the call saying we had been selected to perform at the National Theatre in London. We were a bit shocked to say the least. We immediately jumped back into the rehearsal process and on the 19th June 2023, we travelled down for a three day trip to London. Our time was spent attending workshops run by the National Theatre's own vocal coach, the manager of NTCP and our own Ilkley Playhouse directors Andrew Leggott and Lisa Debney. We then did a Tech rehearsal, and prepared for the performance. We performed in the Dorfman Theatre in front of a sold out audience of 470 people.

From our first rehearsal where we all read the script with confusion, to the later rehearsals where we saw our play come to life; from a tiring coach trip, to an eye-opening next day; from performing exercises run by our own group leaders Andrew Leggott and Lisa Debney to working with a voice specialist at the National Theatre; every part of the process was exciting and taught us about the real world of theatre production. The build-up to the final performance and walking out onto the stage for the first time was something we will never forget. Hearing our music and performing our opening sequence was incredible. Seeing the stage that the National Theatre had put together for us was wonderful and meeting the other company who were performing the same day as us was an amazing opportunity.

It was a transformative experience, and really inspired us to go into theatre.


Science Learning Partnership News




PE Spotlight


Izzy Wright - Athletics and Cross Country




The winning books were:

Farm Twinning Visit

This term the Engineers of the Future and the Eco Team visited Corn Close Farm in Nidderdale. This is part of the Northern Star Academies Trust farm twinning project. The main purpose of the visit was to source insulation for the Energy Generating gym the team are currently building on the school site.

The day began with an introduction to the farm, the students were shown the sustainable methods that the farm has put in place to reduce their carbon footprint and water waste, including their own rainwater harvesting systems, which water crops and serve the visitor facilities.

They were shown some of the animals, the orchard, and the allotments.

They then embarked on a series of activities. The first was to shear several sheep, and then wash and treat the wool so that we could take some back to school

with us to use for insulating the walls of our new build gym, the remainder would be used to create yarn and felt.

At lunchtime, the students enjoyed eating in the orchard and listening to more stories about the farming business and how they have adapted and diversified to create a sustainable lifestyle and income.

In the afternoon the students completed a felting workshop, where they all created their own piece of artwork to take home.

On returning to school, we are now reaching the final stages of our building and have begun to add insulating wool into the wall cavities.

A big thank you to Corn Close Care Farm for having us, and for providing us with the wool for our project free of charge!




Year 6-7 Transition Day

Alumni Career Spotlight




I am Carrie Boon, I attended Skipton Girls' High School from 2012-2019 and have recently graduated from The University of Liverpool with a degree in Architecture.

I have taken a year out to work in a residential architecture practice before going back to Liverpool to start a master's degree in architecture.

1. One misconception is that there are specific A-level requirements for Architecture. I did Math's, Physics and Art which I thought were the ideal subjects to pick for architecture, however, since going to University and meeting other students and talking to tutors, the range of A-levels that were taken was extremely varied and no specific ones are required. Art is something I would suggest having as a subject as the course is extremely design based and you take a lot of knowledge from A-level into the degree, however, as long as you can create a portfolio for your application, a select few on my course hadn't taken Art and still did as well as everyone else.
2. It takes 7 years to qualify as an Architect which is split into 3 RIBA stages. RIBA Part 1 is your Bachelor's degree (3 years), RIBA Part 2 is your Master's degree (2 years) and RIBA Part 3 is work experience and reports (2 years), which you are recommended to have a year experience between Part 1 and 2 and then a year after part 2. The length it takes to qualify can put a lot of people off, but I would highly advise to not let it as everyone is on their own timeline and if it is something you are passionate about then it is extremely worth it. After your 3-year Bachelor, if you decide that qualifying as an Architect isn't what you see yourself doing then the degree can also lead to so many other things that you could go into e.g. interiors, journalism etc. so, if you decide you don't want to complete the 7 years then there are still so many opportunities.
3. Most universities will ask for a portfolio alongside your UCAS application, each with their own requirements. My advice for this would be to carefully pick out your best work, starting with your best piece at the front to really entice the admissions team into selecting you. Don't overcrowd your portfolio with too much text or images, make sure there is enough white space on your pages as this will make each piece stand out more. It is also important whilst applying for university to be researching different Architects and styles that you are interested in, as this will help when it comes to writing your personal statement and portfolio. This also helps when going into your degree as you will begin to form your own style through your designs based off the styles and architects that interest you.
4. Within your 3 years at university your modules will be very similar each year. These consist of 4 design modules and then 4 lecture modules which will be History of Architecture, Structural Design, Environmental Design, and the Urban environment. These can vary throughout the 3 years but are the main subjects that you will study with each lecture module being carried out alongside your Design modules so that you can put the knowledge into practice through your designs.
5. At first Architecture was just an option for me when applying to university between other subjects such as law and business and I wasn't sure what I wanted to do. However, the thing that I now know I made the right decision choosing Architecture is that I now couldn't see myself doing something that isn't creative which the other degrees don't offer. Therefore, if you have a passion for art and the creativeness it brings then I would highly recommend looking into Architecture as a degree.

This was to engage, enthuse and excite students about their futures - to increase aspiration and broaden horizons for all.

We invited a wide array of different organisations ranging from HE providers; FE colleges; to businesses & organisations with well-established Apprenticeship routes covering a variety of sectors (e.g. creative industries; finance; public sector). Each year-group was allocated a time slot and their respective teachers brought them up to the Hall to participate and interact with the representatives.

In preparation for the event in 'Future me' time, every tutor went through the Careers Fair Powerpoint presentation and a 'Treasure Hunt/Bingo card' with question prompts were handed out to all students. These prompts were themed into questions to find out about different educational pathways; different skills/qualifications required for careers; how different organisations recruit; and different courses at FE and HE institutions and were designed to enable students to begin conversations with the representatives. A House competition to complete the most Bingo cards was announced and JBR won the "chocolate-y prize"!

The students had a brilliant time – some even trying out the uniforms of the Police and the Fire Brigade!

Feedback from students about the Careers Fair was also overwhelmingly positive across all year groups:

They explained thoroughly the different paths I could take in the future. The Careers Fair was just a fun way to socialise and learn at the same time.

It was more realistic than just theoretical, and the university representatives were really nice and helpful.

The Careers Fair helped me look at more than one perspective of multiple jobs, alongside steering my interests and likes to other ideas which I hadn't originally considered.

A Year 10 student,

The Careers Fair was an opportunity to talk to people who actually know what jobs are like, rather than just reading about them.

A Year 7 student,

It allowed me to discover things like apprenticeships and colleges in real life rather than just researching about a job online.

A Year 8 student,

It could ask real people about their jobs, and they could tell us what it was really like from first hand experiences.

Feedback from the organisations was also overwhelmingly positive and the representatives were impressed with the students' enthusiasm. Asked to describe the students at the Careers Fair, the organisations described the students as "Confident, curious and interested"; "Engaging, proactive, thoughtful & respectful"; "Polite, interested and high achieving"; "Motivated, engaged, friendly"; "Engaged, prepared and enthusiastic"; "On a mission!".

We can't wait for the next Careers Fair and would like to include even more alumni and explore parental contacts to expand the horizons of our students further.

History Trip to Ripon

In June, the History department organised a trip for Year 10 to Ripon as part of the Crime and Punishment unit studied in the GCSE history course. This consisted of being able to visit the Ripon courthouse, which was built in the 1830's, and reenacting one of the court cases that was once held there. We also learnt about the history of the courthouse, what all the features were and how they were use in the 1800's.

The other museum that we visited was the Prison and Police Museum. This building was first a Victorian prison, then it was turned into a police station and this building held Ripon's first ever police officers. We visited the cells, learnt about how prisoners were treated, and heard about the stories of some of the people involved in 200 years of history, including the case of some notorious poachers and the policemen who tried to arrest them.
